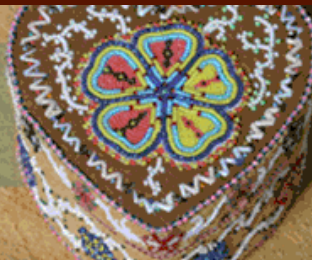

Competitive Scholarship Applications Go Online

Beginning with the April 15, 2009 deadline, **Doyon Foundation competitive scholarship applications will only be accepted online.**

Students planning to apply for 2009 - 2010 competitive scholarships must first create an online account, if they do not already have one. Accounts may be created at www.doyonfoundation.com/CreateAccount.aspx. Students should create an account at least seven days in advance of the scholarship application deadline, as it may take several days for Foundation staff to verify a student's shareholder status.

Students who have difficulties creating an account or who are unable to apply for scholarships online should contact Seeyaa' Charpentier at 907.459.2048 or charpentiers@doyon.com immediately for assistance.

This is the Foundation's first step toward a completely online scholarship application process. All scholarship applications, including basic, vocational and competitive, will need to be submitted online starting with the November 15, 2009 application deadline for spring 2010 scholarships. Additional information about this change will be provided in the coming months.

Doyon Foundation Alumnus Profile: Lee DeWilde



After being an aircraft mechanic for 10 years, Doyon Foundation alumnus Lee DeWilde decided to go back to school to become an engineer. It wasn't an easy decision - or an easy road - but today, DeWilde is a college graduate working as an engineer in the oil industry.

"The biggest challenge for me was getting enough confidence to quit my job and go back to school full-time. I had been an aircraft mechanic for 10 years, I'm married and I have four kids. To go from that to being a freshman at the university was a big shock," said DeWilde, who was 35 when he returned to school.

DeWilde overcame the challenges, though, and graduated in 2004 with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the

University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF), where he was also in the Alaska Native Science and Engineering Program (ANSEP).

Today, DeWilde is a pipeline maintenance engineer with Alyeska Pipeline

Service Company in Fairbanks. He also recently began the Doyon Management Training program, and is a member of the Doyon Foundation Alumni Association.

DeWilde said the funding he received, including several competitive scholarships from Doyon Foundation, was a big benefit.

"I appreciate that Doyon supported a non-traditional student. They gave a 35-year-old man a second chance to get a four-year degree," he said.

Pursuing his engineering degree wasn't DeWilde's first experience on a college campus. Originally from Huslia, he first came to UAF from the village as a 19-year-old.

"When I first went to college, my biggest challenges were peer pressure, funding and homesickness. I didn't do well. I partied too much. When I went back the second time, I had none of that. I was older, a semi-professional, and I had lived in Fairbanks for a while," he said.

DeWilde said his biggest piece of advice isn't for young people, but rather for adult men living in the village.

"I encourage them to pursue their dreams. They should try, even if they're older. It's not too late. Maybe we slipped up when we were younger, but the thing is to try again," DeWilde said.

By doing this, DeWilde said he hopes there will be more good role models for young people.

"I think my going back to school gave my kids a big boost - to see me graduate, make more money, and have me understand what they're going through. I can be a mentor to young people," said DeWilde, who has four children with his wife, Lillian.

While happy with where he is at in life, DeWilde said there is still one thing missing.

"The downside of all of this is I don't have a connection with home. There is no connection between the oil company and my village, so I don't go home very often," he said. "My dream is to go home more often and have a closer connection there. I'm going to find a way to do it. Maybe I'll buy an airplane."

DeWilde is the son of Lloyd and Amelia DeWilde, and the grandson of Victor and Thelma DeWilde of California, and Edwin and Lydia Simon of Huslia.

Applying for a 2009 Scholarship?

April 15 is the deadline to apply for fall 2009 basic and competitive scholarships - are you ready? Be sure you're up-to-date on the application process by reviewing the following important information:

Apply online. Beginning this year, Doyon Foundation will implement a paperless competitive scholarship application process. This means that competitive scholarship applications will only be accepted online at www.doyonfoundation.com.

Get an online account. Students will need an online account to apply for scholarships online. Students without an online account can easily create one at www.doyonfoundation.com/CreateAccount.aspx. This should be done at least seven days in advance of the scholarship application deadline.

Are you eligible? To be eligible for a Doyon Foundation basic or competitive scholarship, applicants must:

- Be enrolled to Doyon, Limited or be the child of an original enrollee. Gifted or inherited shares do not make an individual eligible for scholarships.
- Be accepted to an accredited college, university, technical or vocational school.
- Maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.0 for undergraduates, 3.0 for graduates or masters, and 3.25 for specialists or doctorates.
- Be enrolled in 12 or more credits (undergraduates), or nine or more credits (graduates) to be considered full-time students.
- Be enrolled in one - 11 credits (undergraduates), or one - eight credits (graduates) to be considered part-time students.

Want a basic scholarship? Basic scholarships, which range from \$400 for part-time students to \$800 for full-time students, are awarded four times per year - in the spring, summer, fall and winter (for vocational students only). Applicants must submit:

- A complete application form.
- Proof of enrollment.
- Official transcripts.

Want a competitive scholarship? Competitive scholarships, which range from \$2,000 - \$7,000, are awarded once a year. Recipients, who are selected by an independent review committee, receive half of their scholarship during the fall semester and half during the spring semester. To apply, students are required to:

- Complete an online competitive scholarship application.
- Submit a personal essay online.
- Submit official transcripts.
- Submit proof of enrollment.
- Arrange for two professional letters of reference to be sent directly from the author to the Foundation.

Tips for Student Success

The new year is an excellent time to think about what you want to accomplish during the next 12 months - and how you are going to do it. The first step is to set some goals. Here are some tips to guide your goal-setting:

- Make sure your goal is specific. Who does your goal involve? What do you want to achieve? Where will you accomplish this goal? When will you work toward your goal, and when do you plan to reach it? Why do you want to work toward this goal?
- Is your goal measureable? Think about how you will track your progress toward your goal.
- Set a timeframe. Make sure you keep moving toward your goal by setting a timeframe for achieving your goal. Also, think about timing for steps you want to complete as you work toward your goal.
- Is your goal achievable? A good goal should make you work hard and push your limits, but shouldn't be impossible.
- Reward yourself along the way. Don't wait until you reach your goal to reward yourself. Plan some ways to reward yourself as you reach

milestones along the way.

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
