Tips for Student Success

It's important to think about personal safety when you're living or attending classes on campus. Below are a few tips to keep you safer as you work toward your educational goals!

NEVER:

- Loan your key to anyone. If your keys are lost or stolen, have your locks re-keyed.
- Walk alone at night.
- Prop your dorm room door open.
- Agree to leave your door unlocked - even if a roommate asks you to.
- Leave your ID, wallet, purse, checkbook, jewelry, camera or other valuables unattended or in plain sight.
- Be alone with someone you just met.
- Leave a drink unattended or accept a drink from a stranger.

ALWAYS:

- Share your schedule with family and friends.
- Program your phone's speed dial with emergency numbers, and make sure your friends, roommates and family members have each other's phone numbers, in case of an emergency.
- Lock your door when you are not in your room.
- Know where emergency phones are located, especially in the areas you spend a lot of time.
- Get to know your neighbors.
- Report illegal activities and suspicious behavior.
- Travel in groups, use a shuttle service, and walk in busy, well-lit areas. Stay away from shrubs, dark doorways and alleys.
- Place valuables out of sight in your car. Or, better yet, take your valuables with you!
- Trust your instincts! If you have a feeling that something is wrong, get to a well-traveled, well-lit area or head for an emergency phone, the campus police department or your dorm.

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
