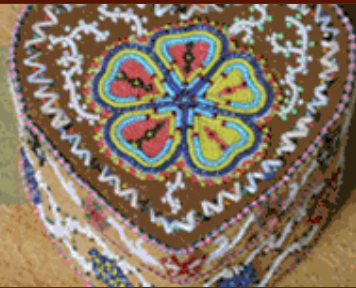

Two members were elected to fill the open seats on the Doyon Foundation board of directors during the Foundation's annual membership meeting on October 18, 2008. Lorraine B. David was elected for a three-year term, and Wesley Roberts Dalton was elected for a two-year term on the board.

David, who is originally from Hughes and now lives in Fairbanks, received her bachelor of business administration degree, with an emphasis in human resource management, from the University of Alaska Fairbanks (UAF) in 1999. She is currently pursuing a bachelor of business administration in accounting. An employee of UAF for the past 28 years, David is currently employed as a program assistant with the UAF Rural Alaska Honors Institute. She also teaches beginning Central Koyukon Athabascan language classes for the Alaska Native Language Center.

"As a member of the board of directors of the Doyon Foundation, I hope to continue to reach out to

students in our area and help them to accomplish their dreams of becoming college educated and outstanding members of society with good paying jobs," David said.

Dalton, who was born in Sitka and currently lives in Fairbanks, graduated in August 2006 from the University of Alaska Anchorage, where he obtained a bachelor of arts in psychology. He currently works as a program specialist at the Procurement Technical Assistance Center in Fairbanks. Among other work experience, Dalton is a graduate of the Doyon Management Training, and is the owner of Authentic Alaskan Productions.

"I hope to help all the other board members in reaching very clear and concise goals that will help the Doyon Foundation better serve our people and make our Foundation stronger and self-sustaining. I hope to make it easier for all Doyon people to go to college," Dalton said.

Stevens, who was born and raised in Fairbanks, is currently employed by CH2M HILL, an engineering, consulting, construction and operations corporation. Although he said work and studying take up most of his time, he also enjoys weightlifting, reading and spending time with his family.

"I would like to thank my fiancé, Kate, and my sister and brother, who have always been there for me and given me hope when I felt there was none," he said.

In addition to support from his family, Stevens is also appreciative of the support from Doyon Foundation.

"Without the help of my corporation, my education would not be possible. With the help that I have received, I can continue to further my education and set a good example for my people," he said. Time to Start Thinking of Upcoming Scholarship Deadlines

It's that time of year - time to start thinking about applying for fall 2009 scholarships. The application deadline for fall 2009 basic and competitive scholarships is April 15, 2009. Here is some important information about applying for scholarships next year:

- **Paperless application process.** Doyon Foundation will be implementing a paperless competitive scholarship application process for 2009 - 2010. This means that competitive scholarship applications will only be accepted online at www.doyonfoundation.com. To get started, students without an online account should first create one at www.doyonfoundation.com/CreateAccount.aspx. This should be done as soon as possible, as it takes one to three days to verify the request.
- **Scholarship eligibility.** To be eligible for a Doyon Foundation basic or competitive scholarship, applicants must be enrolled to Doyon, Limited or be the child of an original enrollee; be accepted to an accredited college, university, technical or vocational school; and maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.0 for undergraduates, 3.0 for graduates or masters, and 3.25 for specialists or doctorates. To be considered full-time, students must be enrolled in 12 or more credits (undergraduates), or nine or more credits (graduates). To be considered part-time, students must be enrolled in one - 11 credits (undergraduates), or one - eight credits (graduates).
- **Basic scholarship application requirements.** Basic scholarships, which

range from \$400 for part-time students to \$800 for full-time students, are awarded four times per year - in the spring, summer, fall and winter (for vocational students only.) Applicants must submit a complete application form, proof of enrollment and official transcripts. For more information on basic scholarship guidelines and policies, visit www.doyonfoundation.com.

- **Competitive scholarship application requirements.** Competitive scholarships, which range from \$2,000 - \$7,000, are awarded once a year. Recipients, who are selected by an independent review committee, receive half of their scholarship during the fall semester and half during the spring semester. To apply, students are required to complete an online competitive scholarship application, and submit a personal essay online. They must also submit official transcripts and proof of enrollment, and arrange for two professional letters of reference to be sent directly from the author to the Foundation. - **Alumni Association assistance.** Members from the Doyon Foundation Alumni Association have volunteered to review students' competitive scholarship applications prior to submission. Applications should be submitted to Doris Miller at 1 Doyon Place, Suite 300, Fairbanks, Alaska 99701 or millerd@doyon.com for review. *Please note: students should submit their applications for review prior to submitting the final application, as applications may not be changed once they have been submitted online.*

Tips for Student Success

Everywhere you look, it seems like people are getting sick. Fellow students, teachers, co-workers, roommates. That's because as fall turns into winter, we enter the dreaded cold and flu season. While the germs that cause colds and flu are all around, there are things you can do to prevent getting sick. For example:

- Wash your hands often with hot water and soap. Use instant hand-sanitizer if you're not near a sink.
- Keep your hands away from your nose, eyes and mouth.
- Don't touch people - or their things - when they are sick.
- Get regular exercise - 30 minutes a day, three times a week at a minimum.
- Eat well - don't skip breakfast, and be sure to eat plenty of fresh fruits and vegetables.
- Get enough sleep.
- Ask your health care provider if you should get a flu shot. There are lots of places you can get discounted - or even free - flu shots.
- If you do get sick, check out the health care services at your school. Most schools have a student health center where you can get medical care and prescriptions at a reduced cost.
